<u>FROM THE SMITHY – THE 'MALENY BELL' –</u> <u>KEVIN HOWELL</u>

Russel Davies has designed and made a new style of bell, which will be known as a Maleny cowbell. The bell has a flared crease on each side – see photo – which gives it a unique tone compared with the many famous bells known to enthusiasts: the Condamine Frogmouth, the Beckett, the Kentucky, and others. After several adjustments, the final design was decided upon and 12 bells were made – note the neat brass welding on the joins to create purity of sound, and the heavy tongue. Ken Scott advised that this was the smallest number required to launch a marketing campaign.

The bells have labels attached and a record book has been opened to register each bell, its number as shown on the label, its size, and other details. If a buyer reports a problem we will have the details and we can make adjustments if required. Ken Scott made and supplied the straps for us.

TAKING A 'SCREEN SHOT'

If you use a computer, one of the things you may have heard about or may have been asked to do is to take a 'screen shot' of whatever is on your screen. So what is that and how do you do it?



Essentially, a screen shot is a snapshot of your whole screen or a particular window on the screen. You save the snapshot as a digital file then you can do whatever is required with that file, such as sending it to a friend or to a support person. You take the screen shot by using a particular combination of keys, which places the screen shot on the Clipboard. Then you paste from the Clipboard into the photo editor of your choice, edit the screen shot (e.g. trim the edges), then save the result as a file.

With a Windows PC, I use the Print Screen button

(Print or PrtSc on some keyboards), usually with another key, depending on what I want a screen shot of. Pressing the Print Screen button on its own takes a snapshot of the whole screen. If you hold down the Alt key then press the Print Screen button (written Alt + PrtSc), this captures only the current window, which is more often what you want. Other computers (including smart phones) use a different set of keys or buttons to achieve the screen shot, but the principle is the same.

Now that you have a 'photo' of your screen on the Clipboard you have to do something to save it. I use the simple image editor Paint, which comes with every version of Windows since Windows 1.0. To start Paint, click the Windows Start button in the bottom left corner of the screen and start to type "Paint". You will see the Paint app listed – click on it and Paint opens. You can also use Corel Draw, IrfanView, Photoshop, or any other image/photo editor you may have. With your image editor open, press Ctrl + V or click the Paste command to insert whatever is on the Clipboard into your image editor. From there you can use all the edit tools available to edit your image then save it wherever you want, e.g. in the Pictures folder.

Note that if you take the screen shot using the key combination of Windows key + PrtScr, the screen dims momentarily and the whole screen image will be automatically saved to a file in the Screen Shots folder under the Pictures folder, without having to paste from the Clipboard. From there you can edit the file as you please.

Have a go at it to see how the process works. Try the different combinations to see the varying results. Then you will have some confidence should the need ever arise.

Don McCabe brought in an interesting project, two stools which had to be lowered 250mm, each with four bent legs with round tenons at the tops fitting into the frame. Accuracy was important and ideas of hand cutting were discounted. Normally turning them on the lathe was impossible. A 'steady rest' (A cast iron frame with three supporting wheels – see photo) was brought in, and this allowed accurate turning, including the new tenon, to be done. Note the bend at the end of the leg which was then free to fly around while the straight part was allowed to rotate in the steady rest.

A member of the public brought in a dining chair, part of a set, which had suffered damage at the top of a leg. We had the broken parts but it was impossible to glue them all back neatly. Ashley decided to make a new leg and stain and finish it to match.

Judging by Ashley's restoration work in the past, we will look forward to another miracle.

Roy Brown has accomplished a work of art with a bowl of multi-coloured woods he turned on the lathe. The parts in contrasting colours had been neatly fitted together to produce a professional result.

Meanwhile, Malcolm worked to replace and varnish the many hardwood staves in five garden benches with cast iron ends. Thanks Malcolm, your hard work is greatly appreciated. The benches will be sold for club funds at a garage sale later in the year (If the virus doesn't prevent it).

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FROM THE HISTORICAL SOCIETY – DESLEY MALONE

Two years ago, the Society was offered a doll collection of 600 porcelain dolls, each handcrafted by Louise Cogzell who has family history to Maleny from the late 1940s. The



collection was made over 40 years and Louise & Ron are anxious for them to find a home. Tom & I saw the collection and were impressed at the number, how SO astonishinaly beautiful they are. all catalogued and named and in immaculate condition. The dolls represent people and cultures from around the world. Characters can be remembered and seen from childhood fairy-tales, novels, movie stars, members of the royal family, farm workers etc. They vary in size, Lady Diana is 1m tall. Louise has requested that they be displayed as a family.

I presented photos to the MH&HS Management Committee who agreed to accept the offer and we're going to display them in 2 middle rooms in Glenferna. I've secured funding to have specially crafted cabinets made to keep the collection safe and to be displayed in categories for different exhibitions. The cabinets are presently being constructed locally and will be installed soon.

We have other dolls in the cottages at the Village. Priscilla Cottage displays the Bryce family possessions which includes a beautiful little girl doll given to Isabella Bryce on her 3rd birthday in 1917 when her Uncle Alex was serving in WW1. The Lawley House collection includes 2 celluloid baby dolls dating pre WW11, both dolls with provenance to Maleny's pioneering families. Just recently we've been gifted a Hertwig doll dated C1880, from Germany. The little girl who owned this doll was Jane (Trail) Hankinson b 21.05.1885 whose grandmother was Jane Dunlop, the first white woman to live on the Range. This doll needs to be restored and preserved before she can be displayed in Lawley House and will be our most outstanding item with provenance to Maleny's history.

The Louise Coazell dolls will enrich our collection and give our visitors including school groups more to enioy. It'll be a wonderful asset to the Pioneer Village, tourist industry of Maleny and to the local community. Two retired school principals (with more than a shipping container of memorabilia between them) will be helping set up the school display on the back verandah of Glenferna after the dolls are installed. The Telecommunication Room is still under construction. Members of the Men's Shed are helping with this project.





We're looking forward to the Open day on 14 November.




